

John M^r. John Dwyer & Thomas Hanigan appellants (Pool & Cooper, Respondents) Whereas, by an order bearing date the fifteenth day of January One thousand eight hundred and twenty seven, made by the Court of Quarter Sessions then holden at Clonmel in the County of Tipperary, It was ordered by the Court, that the Commissioners under the Tithe Composition Act for the Parish of Ballyshusban in the said County of Tipperary "do replot the lands in said parish, in such manner, as that the bog in possession of the appellants be charged only according to its surface value as pasture, and not rated by the profit which may be derived from it by manufacturing leaf mason" Now, see the Commissioners, in pursuance of said order, having replotted the lands in said parish, do award as follows, We find the lands in said Parish to be, according to our Survey thereof, five thousand three hundred and fifty seven acres and twelve perches, plantation measure, we award that one thousand and fifty acres and thirty two perches, value forty shillings per acre and marked first quality, shall pay the sum of two shillings and six pence per acre, and so in proportion for woods and perches as a composition for all the tithes thereof, we award that one thousand six hundred and forty one acres and sixteen perches, value thirty two shillings and eight pence per acre, and marked second quality, shall pay the sum of two shillings and one penny per acre, and so in proportion for woods and perches as a composition for all the tithes thereof, We award that two thousand one hundred and fifty one acres, one rood and four perches, value twenty one shillings per acre and marked third quality shall pay the sum of one shilling and four pence per acre and so in proportion for woods and perches as a composition for all the tithes thereof, We award that one hundred and thirty three acres, value eight shillings per acre and marked fourth quality shall pay the sum of six pence per acre and so in proportion for woods and perches, as a composition for all the tithes thereof, We award that one hundred and twenty nine acres and two roods, value four shillings per acre and marked fifth quality shall pay the sum of three pence per acre and so in proportion for woods and perches as a composition for all the tithes thereof, and we award that two hundred and fifty ^{two} acres, marked sixth quality, the surface of which not being of any value for pasture, shall not be subject to any sum as a composition for the tithes thereof, We find that the above mentioned different sums payable out of the above quantity of land make the sum of four hundred and fifty pounds late Irish currency, being the sum agreed on as a composition for all the tithes thereof, all the sums of money herein mentioned are in the late Irish currency and all the surveys are in Plantation measure. In the surveys the roads are not included,
