

certified under their hands was on the 25th day of September in the year 1849 lodged in the Council Office in Dublin Castle at the instance of the said Lord Bishop of Ossory, Leighlin, and Ferns, and proposed by him:

And Whereas on the 26th and 27th days of said month of September, 1849, a copy of the said proposed Plan so approved of by the said Arch bishop and Bishop as aforesaid with the Ordinance Sheets referred to therein and marked and coloured as aforesaid was sent to each of the Patrons whose consent would have been rendered necessary to the effecting of the proposed Division of the said Union of Burinchurch if the said recited Act of the 11th and 12th Vict. Cap. 41 had not passed, and together with such copy & Ordinance Sheets a Notice in writing was also served upon each of the said parties calling on them within six weeks after the date of the service of such notice to lodge or cause to be lodged in the Council Office in Dublin Castle a statement in writing of his or their objections to said Instrument or any part thereof if any such they had: And Whereas on the 5th day of November in the year of Our Lord 1849, the Reverend Thomas Stuart Townsend, D.D., Incumbent of the Union of Burinchurch, caused to be lodged in the Council Office in Dublin Castle a statement in writing of certain objections made by him to said proposed Plan: And Whereas such Plan and Instrument as aforesaid and the objections of the said Reverend Thomas Stuart Townsend were taken into consideration as required by said Act: And Whereas His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant and Privy Council being of opinion that the said Plan should be altered in certain respects, did thereupon alter the same, and such Instrument being so altered was thereupon returned to the said Lord Bishop of Ossory, Ferns, and Leighlin, by whom it was originally proposed and approved: And Whereas such Instrument so altered as aforesaid has been sent back to the Privy Council Office with the approval of the said Lord Arch bishop of Dublin and Bishop of Ossory, Ferns, and Leighlin endorsed thereon and which said Instrument so altered and approved of is in the words and figures following, that is to say:

To His Excellency George William Frederick, Earl of Clarendon, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland in Council — The following Plan for the Division of the Union of Burinchurch, otherwise Kiltranyn, in the Diocese of Ossory, and for the annexing of the parts separated therefrom to other Parishes in the same Diocese, is submitted, together with the Sheets of the Ordinance Survey of Ireland in which the Parishes and parts of Parishes so to be divided and united are situate, marked and coloured as required by the Act 11 and 12 Victoria Cap. 41.

Burinchurch is a real Union erected by Act of Council in 1648. The members of the Union are enumerated in the Act, but from a change of denominations, and perhaps other causes in the interval it is impossible to identify them throughout with those of the existing Union as it has been
