

William Shanly Commissioner duly appointed
and sworn, under and by virtue of an Act made in the Second
and Third Years of the Reign of King William the Fourth, intitled
an Act to amend Three Acts passed respectively in the Fourth
Fifth, and in the Seventh and Eight Years of the Reign of His
late Majesty King George the Fourth providing for the establishing
of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland, and to make such Compositions
Permanent, to ascertain and fix a true and just composition
for all Tithes arising, growing, yielded, or payable within the
Parish of Carrigallen in the County of Leitrim
do hereby Certify, that the True and just Amount of Compositions
for all Tithes whatever within the said Parish is Four Hundred
and Fifty pounds Sterling by the Year, being the Average of the
Seven Years preceding the first of November, One Thousand Eight Hundred
and Thirty, of which sum of Four Hundred and Fifty pounds, one
Hundred and Fifty One Pounds, One Shilling and Six pence, being
Twothird parts of the Tithes of the following Lands in said Parish
according to a Terrier of the Glebes, Tithes, and other Ecclesiastical
ties in the Parish of Carrigallen, - found amongst the Records of
the Registry of the Diocese of Kilmore viz. Aughaville or
Aughavone, Aughawillon, Beamore, Beahig, Corragh, Cornahy,
Cullis, Drumhalry, Drumergool, Drumanure, Drumtelwick,
Drumbainleis, Drumdington, Ercw, Gatermore, Kilnamart,
Kilbraeken, Killegar, Killaheute, Loughill and Drumcroft,
Mulanadara, Sepiagh, Sepiagh nagle, or Gulladuff, Sennagh
and Cloughlea, and Tully, - are due and payable to the Lord's
Bishop of Kilmore, as a Composition for the Tithe claimable as
Rector of said Parish, And Two Hundred and Ninety Eight pounds
Eighteen Shillings and Six pence, being the remaining One third
part of the foregoing Lands, and all the Tithes of the following
viz. Arnyham, Aughalague, Bredaugh, Cloncorick, Cloncoose,
Co. cat, Cabrack, Co. glays, Cornafirst, Clonbushier, Colloho,
Coolastin, Drumlevar, and Annagh, Druminchon, Hootneagh
