

We, John Rorke of Jamestown, in the County of Dublin, and
William Palmer of Margaret Street, Dublin, in said County, Esquires, Commissioners duly
appointed and sworn, under and by virtue of an Act made and passed, in the Fourth year
of the Reign of His present Majesty King George the Fourth, intituled, "An Act to provide for
the establishing of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland for a limited time," and of an act made
and passed in the Fifth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to amend an Act of
the last Session of Parliament, for providing for the establishing of Compositions for Tithes in
Ireland," and of an act made and passed in the seventh and eighth years of His Majesty's Reign,
intituled, "An Act to amend the Acts for the establishing of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland
to ascertain and fix a true and just Composition for all Tithes, arising, growing, yielded
or payable, within the Parish of Kilgobbin, in the Diocese and County of Dublin, do
hereby Certify that the true and just amount of Composition for all Tithes whatever,
within the said Parish of Kilgobbin, is, one hundred and fifty pounds, Sterling, by the year,
which sum is due and payable to the Reverend Henry Kearney, as a Composition for the Tithes
claimable by him as perpetual Curate and Ecclesiastical Incumbent of the said Parish - the
said Annual Sum of one hundred and fifty pounds Sterling, having been agreed to by
the said Henry Kearney, perpetual Curate and Incumbent as aforesaid, with the assent
of His Grace, William Lord Archbishop of Dublin, as Bishop of the Diocese and in
Rotation with the Archdeacon of Dublin, Patron of said Benefice, and also with the assent
of The Reverend John Farren, Archdeacon of Dublin, Patron as aforesaid, signified in
writing and signed by them respectively, and assented to, and accepted at a special Meeting
duly called and assembled under the provisions of the said Act, in the said Parish of
Kilgobbin, on Tuesday the 25th day of September 1827, and to take effect from the first
day of November next.

Iud we do further Certify that the average price of Oats
being the Corn principally grown in said County, for the period of seven years, ending
on the first day of November 1821, according to a Schedule thereof, furnished by the
Right Honorable Henry Goulburn, late Chief Secretary to the Lord Lieutenant of
Ireland, is fifteen shillings and two pence farthing, late Irish currency, or fourteen shillings
and one farthing, British per Barrel.
