

I Clement Russell Taylor Commissioner duly appointed
and sworn under and by Virtue of an Act made in the
second and third years of the Reign of William the Fourth
established an Act to amend three Acts passed in the fourth and
fifth, seventh and eighth years of the Reign of his late Majesty
George the Fourth Providing for the Establishing of Tithes
for Tythes in Ireland and to make such Tithes permanent
for all Tythes arising growing, yielded or payable within
the Parish of Kiltiernan in the Diocese and in the County
of Dublin Do hereby Certify that the true and just
Amount of Tithes for all Tythes whatever within the
said Parish is one hundred and Eighty one Pounds Three
Shillings and Eight pence by the year, of which Sum Sixty
Six Pounds one Shilling and seven pence is due and payable
to Sir Compton Domville Bt as Proprietor of a Portion of the
Rectorial Tythes of the Townland of Kiltiernan and of all
the Rectorial Tythes of the Townland of Ballybetagh; Sixty
Three Pounds Eleven Shillings and Eight Pence is also due
and payable to Thomas Peter Fitzsimon Esq. as Proprietor of the
Tythes of the Townland of Glencullen; Nine Pounds eighteen
Shillings and eleven pence is also due and payable to Mrs
Anderson as Proprietress of a Portion of the Rectorial Tythes
of the Townland of Kiltiernan and the remaining Sum of
Forty one Pounds eleven Shillings and six pence is likewise
due and payable to the Reverend Henry Kearney being a
Rector of the Rectorial Tythes of the Townland of Kiltiernan
and ^{the} Remainer as the Clergyman having actually the
Use of Souls within and throughout the said Parish
of Kiltiernan

And I further Certify that the Average Prices of Wheat and
of Oats being the Cereals principally grown in such Parishes
for the period of Seven Years ending on the first day of
November 1830 are one pound twelve Shillings and one
halfpenny per barrel for Wheat and Twelve Shillings and
eleven pence for Oats by the Barrel Dated this Nineteenth
Day of May 1834
