

"of Kinneagh to the Vicars Choral of Saint Patrick's for which they have agreed to take Eighty  
"pounds yearly, And also one third of the sum that is to be raised off the Lands of Corbally,  
"Newtown and Ballycoleen, in the County of Kildare and Ballyhaket and Philipstown  
"in the County of Carlow, and one third of two thirds of the sum that is to be raised  
"off the Lands of Ricketts town and Rathdaniel in said County, And one third of two thirds  
"of Laragreen in the County of Kildare to the Rev'd John Spray, as Vicar of Kinneagh being  
"the sum of, the hundred and fourteen pounds fourteen shillings and three pence halfpenny,-  
"And We do further certify, that the average price of Wheat being the Corn principally  
"grown in said Counties for the period of seven years ending on the first day of November  
"1821- is one pound eighteen shillings and four pence halfpenny, per Bushel - Dated  
"January 9<sup>th</sup> 1826- (interlined the proportion of the Lord of the Soil) Wm Young, Fishbourne"

And Whereas an Appeal against the said Certificate having been duly made to  
His Excellency Richard Marquess Wellesley, then Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor  
of Ireland, by the Rev'd John Whitty, setting forth amongst other matters that he was duly and  
regularly presented Instituted and Inducted into the Rectories and Vicarages of the united Parishes  
of Rathdrum, Rathmore, Stables and Rathill. That his Predecessors Incumbents of said  
Parish of Rathmore had been from time immemorial entitled to and had received and been  
paid the Tithes of said Lands of Ricketts town and Rathdaniel (awarded by a Certificate  
to Hugh Loring and John D' Buckley) and Prayed that he the Appellant might be  
declared to be entitled to the Tithes thereout. And Notice of such Appeal having  
been duly given, - the said Appeal in pursuance of an order for that purpose came on  
to be heard before the said Richard Marquess Wellesley then Lord Lieutenant of Ireland  
in Council on the 27<sup>th</sup> day of January, 1827, the said Hugh Loring and John D' Buckley  
appearing by their Counsel as Respondents to said Appeal. And it being alleged  
in the said Appeal, that the Appellant had filed a Bill in the Court of Exchequer +  
against several of the Occupiers of the said Lands for subtraction of Tithes and which  
Suit was then still pending and undetermined. It was Ordered upon Hearing of  
the said Appeal on the said 27<sup>th</sup> of January, 1827. "That the Certificate therein
