

Observations on the following Applotment.

In preparing the Valuation of those parts of the Parish of Lisimore and Mocollop, of which the Tithes belong to the Dean & Chapter, and the Vicars Choral of Lisimore, we have not been assisted by any general survey of the Parish. A such survey would have cost nearly double the sum to which the expenses of the applotment and Valuation are limited by the Acts of Parliament under which the Composition was effected, an application was made by us to the Chief Secretary to the Lord Lieutenant to ascertain whether any greater advance could be made in consequence of the great extent of this Parish. Having been informed that no fund had been provided for any such extraordinary expenses, we were obliged to rely upon Maps and other documents in the possession of individuals, particularly those which are in Lisimore Castle. In some instances where no such Maps could be procured, we have depended upon Returns given to the occupiers of lands by Surveyors who had at different periods surveyed their farms, using however the precaution of obliging the persons who produced such Returns to verify them upon Oath. The manner in which these surveys were made must, unavoidably give rise to some mistakes, to which a general survey would not be liable. Under these circumstances we do not presume that our Return of the acreage of every Holding is free from error; but we have endeavoured to attain accuracy by a close inspection of every farm, and a comparison of its contents with the Return made to us by the occupier, or by his Landlord. We have, according to the best of our Judgment, and to the time which we were enabled to devote to this applotment, divided the arable lands into five Classes, considering that this number would be sufficient for the arrangement of such lands according to their proper qualities without material injury to any individuals. To these we have added two Classes for Woodlands and Mountain. The applotment of the Composition on each farm is made by dividing the total Contents into those Classes according to their intrinsic values, without reference to the effects of negligent Cultivation or of any recent expenditure of Capital. The Composition stated in our Return for the entire was fixed by adding together the amount of the Composition on each separate Class.

The lands in the first Class being averaged at Forty shillings an acre per annum, and the annual Composition for the same Class being fixed at Five shillings and four pence per acre. The Comparative annual values, and the Composition of those in the other Classes will be respectively represented by the annexed Scale.

1 st Class, the average annual value being 40 ^s per acre, the annual Composition is 2:4 per acre	
2 nd Class. 30 ^s per acre	1:9 per acre
3 rd Class 20 ^s per acre	1:3 per acre
4 th Class 10 ^s per acre	=:10 per acre
5 th Class 6 ^s per acre	=:6 per acre
Woodlands 2:6 per acre	=:2 per acre
Mountain 1:6 per acre	=:1 1/4 per acre

The following applotment was made in order to carry into effect an Agreement entered into between the said Dean and Chapter and Vicars Choral of the one part and the Parsonage of the said Parish of the other part at a Vestry held in Lisimore Cathedral on the First day of November 1824 and subsequently duly Confirmed - By this Agreement the Sum of £1700 - was taken as the annual Composition for twentyone years for all the tithes of a certain distinct District in the said Parish consisting of the Townlands hereinafter mentioned, and which tithes were payable to the said Dean and Chapter and Vicars Choral in the proportions hereinafter set forth -
