 appointed and sworn under and by virtue of an Act made in the fourth  
 year of the Reign of King George the 4<sup>th</sup> entitled "an Act to provide for  
 the establishing of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland for a limited time"  
 to ascertain and fix a true and just Composition for all Tithes  
 arising growing yielded or payable in a certain distinct district  
 in the Parish of Lismore consisting of the Townlands hereinafter men-  
 tioned and their sub-denominations all in the Diocese of Lismore and  
 County of Waterford Do hereby Certify that the true and just amount  
 of Composition for all Tithes whatever within or out of said District  
 is Four hundred pounds per annum as agreed upon at a Special  
 Vestry duly held pursuant to said Act in the Cathedral Church of  
 Lismore on the sixth day of March One thousand eight hundred and  
 twenty nine And we further certify that the said distinct District  
 consists of the following Townlands and their sub-denominations viz  
 Aghish, Ahanboy, Ballydesane, Ballygally, Ballygarra, otherwise  
 Castle Richard, Ballymasta, Coolowen, Curroughreigh, Garrybrittas,  
 Garrybrittas, Garrycloyne, Knocknamuck, Knockree, Lispinny and  
 Tallowbridge Holdings And we further certify that the above  
 mentioned Lands are all the Lands contained in the distinct  
 District for the entire Tithes of which the above annual sum of  
 Four hundred pounds was agreed to be taken at the Composition  
 at the said Vestry And we further certify that the said annual  
 sum of Four hundred pounds is payable to the Dean of Lismore  
 And we certify that the first half yearly payment of said annual  
 sum of Four hundred pounds shall be due and payable to the said  
 Dean of Lismore on the first day of November next And we do  
 further certify that the average price of oats, being the corn +++  
 principally grown in the said County of Waterford for the period  
 of seven years ending the first day of November One thousand  
 eight hundred and twenty one is fifteen shillings and two pence  
<sup>of the late Irish currency</sup> ~~eight~~ <sup>fourteen</sup> pence per barrel according to the average prices stated in the  
 Dublin Gazette within said period Dated this Thirty first day of  
 March One thousand eight hundred and twenty nine -  
"of the late Irish currency" being just intimated.
