



We, Robert Pauson, of Glasbealy, in the County of Kildare, and William Ashe, of Harraghmore, in said County, Esquires, Commissioners duly appointed and Sworn, under and by Virtue of an Act made in the Fourth year of the Reign of King George the Fourth, intituled, "An Act to provide for the establishing of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland for a limited time", to ascertain and fix a true and just composition for all Tithes arising, growing, yielded, or payable, within the Parish of Harraghmore in the County of Kildare, do hereby Certify that the true and just amount of Composition for all Tithes whatever, within the said Parish of Harraghmore, is seven hundred pounds Sterling, by the year, which sum is due and payable to the Venerable Archdeacon John Parsons, as a Composition for the Tithes claimable by him as Rector and Vicar of the said Parish - The said Annual Sum of seven hundred pounds Sterling, having been agreed to by the said Archdeacon Parsons, Rector and Vicar, as aforesaid, with the Consent in writing of His Grace the Lord Archbishop of Dublin, as Bishop of the Diocese and Patron of said Benefice, and assented to, and accepted at a Special Vestry duly called and assembled under the provisions of the said Act, in the said Parish of Harraghmore on Wednesday the fifth day of October 1825, and to take effect from the first day of November following, and to continue, and be in force, for the term of Twenty one years thence ensuing, and to be invariable, and not subject to any Variation in the amount thereof, during the said Period of Twenty one years, whatever the price of Corn may be.

And we do further Certify that the average price of ~~the~~ ^{the} Corn principally grown in said County for the period of seven years ending on the first day of November 1821, is one pound ^{shillings} eight pence and eight farthings per Barrel.
