We the Commissioners appointed to carry into effect within the Parish of Stillorgan the provisions of the Act of the 4 George 4 Chap 99 and for apportioning the amount of Composition (being One Hundred and One Pounds, Ten Shillings and Nine pence British, One Hundred and Ten Pounds late currency) do find that said Parish contains Six Hundred and Sixty Nine Acres, Three Roods and Thirty Nine One fourth perches Statute Measure, whereof Sixty Acres and Thirty Nine One fourth perches are unprofitable, being occupied by Roads, Woods (under which no grass grows) Ponds and Streams, that all the profitable is as nearly as possible of the same intrinsic Value, except in the vicinity of old grown Timber, that in order to avoid the expense of surveying said Parish, we have supposed every Villa to contain One Acre, Two Roods and Nineteen One fourth Perches of waste, and where we have seen reason to make a larger deduction we have had the waste regularly surveyed and its amount (minus the usual allowance of One Acre, Two Roods and Nineteen One fourth perches) deducted from the occupiers gross quantity

We also find that Three and four pence British is the proportionable charge for each Statute Acre,
