

I John Edward Langford having been appointed and sworn a commissioner (under and by virtue of an act made in the second and third years of the reign of King William the fourth to amend and make permanent three acts made in the seventh and eighth years of the Reign of King George the fourth providing for the settling of composition for tithes in Ireland) to ascertain and fix a true and just composition for all tithes arising growing yielding or payable within that Part of the Parish of Tocumshane called the perpetual Curacy of Churchtown in the County of Meath and in the Diocese of St. Asaph

I do certify that that the true and best amount of composition for that part of the Parish called the perpetual Curacy of Churchtown is seventy Pounds ten shillings and three half pence Sterling by the year according to the average of the seven years preceding November 1830 are due and payable to the Rev. Walter Greene as a composition for the tithes claimed by him as Curate of said Parish

And I do further certify that the average price of oats as taken from the Dublin Gazette for the seven years preceding November 1830 is twelve shillings and eleven pence halfpenny Sterling per barrel being the corn principally grown in this County
