

Parish of Templequinnlan

I John Kildal, Commissioner, duly appointed
and sworn, under and by virtue of an Act, made in the
Seventh and third years of the Reign of his Majesty, King
King William the Fourth
Intituled,

"An Act to Amend Three Acts passed respectively in the
Seventh, Fifth and in the Seventh and Eighth years of the Reign of
His Majesty King George the Fourth, providing for the establishing
of Compositions for Tithes in Ireland & to make such Compositions
Permanent." 10 August 1832.

To ascertain and fix a true and Just Composition for all Tithes
arising, growing, yielded or payable within the Parish of Temple-
quinnlan, in the County of Cork, do hereby certify, that the true
and Just Amount of Compositions for all Tithes, whatever within
the said Parish is Two Hundred and Thirty Pounds one Shilling
and Eight Pence Sterling by the year. Of which sum of Two
Hundred and Thirty Pounds one Shilling and Eight Pence
One Half, that is to say One Hundred and Fifteen Pounds and
Ten Pence Sterling, is due and payable to John Evans, Lucas, Esq-
or Tenant for same, under His Grace the Duke of Devonshire
(the Inpropriator of said Manors, being the Rectorial Tithes of
said Parish) by virtue of a Lease granted by the then Duke of
Devonshire to Thomas Lucas, Grandfather of the aforesaid
Tenant, dated 2nd May 1763 for and during a term of Three Lives
one of which, namely Mary Croft, alias Lucas, is still now being.
The other Half, that is to say One Hundred and Fifteen Pounds
and Ten Pence Sterling is due and payable to the Rev Geo Owsington
or Vicar of said Parish.

And I do further certify that the Average Price of Wheat during the seven
years ended on the first Novr 1830, was one pound Twelve Shillings and
one Halfpenny of Barrel, and that the Price of Oats during same period
was Twelve Shillings and Eleven Pence halfpenny of Barrel, wheat and Oats
being the Corn principally grown in said County of Cork. Dated this
