

We Molloy McDermott of Alderford and  
Michael Keogh of Mount Grove, Commissioners duly appointed  
and sworn under and by virtue of an Act made in the fourth  
year of the Reign of King George the fourth entitled an Act  
to provide for the establishment of Compositions for tithes in  
Ireland for a limited time, to ascertain and fix a true and  
just Composition for all tithes arising, growing, yielded  
or payable within the Parish of Kilmacraugh in the County  
of Meath, do hereby certify that the true and just amount  
of Composition for all tithes whatever within the said Parish  
(with the exception of Four Quarters of land called Killkear, the  
whole of the tithes whereof are claimed by Lord Lorton, but the  
occupying Tenants whereof claim to have the lands tithes-free)  
is One Hundred and fifteen Pounds by the Year; of which sum  
of One hundred and fifteen Pounds, One half is due and  
payable to the Rev. W. Shaw the Vicar of said Parish,  
and the remaining half is due and payable to William  
Molloy Esquire or his Tenant Robert Cheson as Ten-  
-in-principal.

And We have fixed on the said sum of One  
Hundred and fifteen Pounds, being the amount of the  
agreement unanimously entered into between the Proprietors  
of tithes and the Special Vestry, to continue without  
alteration with respect to the value of corn or otherwise  
for the term of Twenty One Years from the first day  
of November One Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty  
four 1824, and which Vestry was held at Kilmacraugh  
on the eleventh day of October instant.
